What is a sleeper berth rule?

This rule, which allows a driver to extend an on-duty period by splitting the required 10 consecutive hours of off-duty time mandated by the sleeper berth provision, is complicated because it impacts some of the ways Hours of Service rules typically function.

A sleeper berth must be located so that leaks in the vehicle's exhaust system or fuel system do not permit fuel, fuel system gases, or exhaust gases to enter the sleeper berth. A portable power supply is a device that can store and provide electrical energy for various purposes. It can power small appliances, charge electronic devices, or supply emergency backup power in case of a blackout. Portable power supplies are usually rechargeable and have different capacities and features depending on the intended use.

Use of a sleeper berth is one way a driver can meet this 10-hour off-duty requirement. Scope. This provision applies to drivers and motor carriers operating property-carrying commercial motor vehicles (CMVs) in interstate commerce that are equipped with a sleeper berth in compliance with the Federal Motor Carrier Safety Regulations (FMCSRs).

The driver can use the sleeper berth to get the equivalent of at least 10 consecutive hours off duty. This is also known as the "split sleeper berth" provision. To take advantage of this provision, a driver must spend at least 8 consecutive hours (but less than 10) in their sleeper berth.

The driver must have another break of at least 7 consecutive hours spent entirely in a sleeper berth, sometime before or after (but not necessarily connected with) the shorter break. The two breaks together must add up to at least 10 ...

Sleeper Berth: The portion of the tractor behind the seats which acts as the "living space" for the driver. It generally contains a bed (or bunk beds), cabinets, lights, temperature control knobs, and 12 volt plugs for power.

To be considered a sleeper berth, the compartment must conform to the requirements outlined in FMCSR 393.76. Modern sleeper berths typically provide many additional features for driver comfort. Schneider's sleeper cabs, for ...

If the sleeper berth was installed on or after January 1, 1963, the exit must be a doorway or opening at least 18 inches high and 36 inches wide. If the sleeper berth was installed before January 1, 1963, the exit must have sufficient area to contain an ellipse having a major axis of 24 inches and a minor axis of 16 inches.

(3) Access. A sleeper berth must be constructed so that an occupant's ready entrance to, and exit from, the sleeper berth is not unduly hindered. (b) Location.
