Will Croatia build Europe's largest energy storage project?

Croatia is preparing to build Eastern Europe's largest energy storage project. IE Energy has secured EUR19.8 million (\$20.9 million) to develop a 50 MW storage system, potentially extendable to 110 MW by 2024.

How much ie-energy aid will Croatia get?

The European Commission has approved EUR19.8 million (US\$20.1 million) in state aid from the government of Croatia to energy storage operator IE-Energy for a series of grid-connected projects. The aid will be a direct grant to IE-Energy and will cover approximately 30% of capital expenditures for a series of grid-scale battery energy storage systems.

Is Croatia ready for solar energy storage?

"There is immense scope for energy storage in Croatia, predominantly for battery storage." GlobalData says that Croatia is now on target to meet its 36.4% renewable energy target by 2030. However, its recent investment in energy storage has not been accompanied by rapid solar PV development.

How much does a project cost in Croatia?

The Croatian Ministry of Economy and Sustainable Development said the goal is for companies to produce energy for self-consumption, which should bring down energy costs. Companies can secure between EUR100,000 and EUR2 million per project. Developers can apply for multiple projects, with the maximum amount per single applicant capped at EUR4 million.

How much money does Croatia need to install solar power in 2022?

The Croatian government has allocated EUR60 million (\$65.6 million) in subsidies for businesses to install 80 MW of renewables and 20 MWh of batteries. Croatia may only install 2.5 MW of PV in 2022.

How is energy used in Croatia?

Total energy supply (TES) includes all the energy produced in or imported to a country, minus that which is exported or stored. It represents all the energy required to supply end users in the country.

According to Eurostat, gross primary energy consumption in Croatia in 2021 was 9.61 Terrawatt hours (TWh) and final energy consumption was 8.1 TWh. Renewable energies account for 31.33 % of Croatia's energy mix, with 53.47% of total electricity production coming from renewables, primarily large hydropower plants.

It is interesting to note that Croatian Energy Strategy [12] adopted in 2009 is substantially less environmentally oriented compared to its 2002 precedent as it envisages the construction of two power plants burning coal and allows for the possibility of building a nuclear power plant.
