Does Japan use a power outlet?

Most North American electronics, including phone chargers and computer plugs, are adaptable to Japan's voltage range. The only hiccup occurs with three-pin plugs - but as we've discussed, this is easily remedied with an adapter. Japan uses 100V power outlets, lower than North America's 110-120V.

Do I need a power adapter to travel to Japan?

If you're traveling to Japan from a country that uses a different voltage and/or plug type, you will need a conversion plug or a power adapter to use your electronic devices. Here's what you should consider: 1. Plug Adapter: If your devices can handle 100 volts and only the plug shape is different, you'll need a plug adapter.

Does Japan use 100 volt power outlets?
